- Organization of a WG WG may rely on financial and organisational support from BIGSAS;
- Documentation of a WG



Food Storage for Emergency:

Right now, there is no need to store food in Germany (In German: Hamsterkäufe, meaning to shop like a nervous, bulging-cheeked hamster). All supermarkets are open in their regular time from 7:00 to 20:00. The Bavarian governor has recommended that some supermarkets to be open on Sunday from 12:00 to 18:00 to meet the demand, so some supermarkets might be open on Sunday in Bayreuth but the details wait to be confirmed.



University of Bayreuth:

Most of the university facilities and offices have been closed down, but they can still be reached through emails or telephone. BIGSAS secretary's office will still be available during the official opening hours, but only by email.
