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A visit from Minister Svenja Schulze

BIGSAS Junior Fellows had the opportunity to meet and engage with her. Thierry Boudjekeu and Monika Rohmer shared stories and research from current doctoral students and alumni, emphasizing the importance of preserving BIGSAS' excellent academic legacy. They proposed the need for more scholarships for African female applicants and continued collaboration with the Ministry. The minister showed great interest in their presentations and elaborated on her diplomatic work and political agenda during an open discussion and a tour of the Iwalewahaus exhibition.

Workshops (co-)organised by Junior Fellows Peer Learning and Exchange Session on Accounting for Travel Expenses

On 7 July, Eileen and Monika organized a peer workshop on accounting for travel expenses. Before the peer session, several JFs had contacted us on an individual basis with questions regarding their applications and accounting for field research. Issues raised ranged from accessing money in various African countries to the correct way to handle receipts during and after the research.

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Stakeholders Workshop and Advanced Methods Lab III at the University of Pretoria

Through the Cluster-funded project -The Intractable Problems of Human Rights- the Chair of African Legal Studies held a Stakeholders Workshop and Advanced Methods Lab III, from 22nd to 24th August 2023 at the Centre for Human Rights, University of Pretoria. The event was cohosted with the Centre for Human Rights, University of Pretoria, to discuss and debate the three intractable human rights issues: child labour, human trafficking, and LGBTQI+ rights. The workshop brought together a diverse group of twenty-one stakeholders, including academics from various fields such as law, sociology, education, practicing lawyers, PhD students, and international rela-



tions practitioners. The workshop included presentations by participants on the three human rights issues, in-depth panel discussions on key legal and institutional barriers impeding the protection of

these issues, and an advanced methods lab where participants debated whether mixed methods approaches to socio-legal problems could be a solution for these hard issues.



Although there were heated debates, the participants reached a consensus regarding the recognition of the interdisciplinarity of these three intractable problems and the need to apply mixed methods in resolving them. There was also agreement on the need to decolonize African education and laws and to re-Africanize the same to better come up with solutions fit for purpose.

The workshop will result in an edited book that will be published in 2024. The book will include various paper contributions from the workshop participants, identifying the status quo of the intractable problems and possible solutions to the same.





PhotoVoice as a Practice of Representation and Social Solidarity

On 6 June, Carla and Eileen invited Prof. Shose Kessi from the University of Cape Town, South Africa, to give a workshop for Junior Fellows revolving around methodological reflections, offering tools to elevate epistemologies from the Global South and to end epistemic violence reproduced through the illusion of methodological objectivity. During the workshop, the PhotoVoice method was introduced, the Social Justice component was highlighted, and the participants were invited to try their first practical exercises applying the method.










This term's topics and issues

About the Reps




